Did the Egyptian people speak some of the language of Mary and Joseph?






Did little Jesus start to learn the Egyptian language while he lived in Egypt, especially if he was playing with other young Egyptian children, the children of that land?

WALUNGURRU (KINTORE) CAMPUS


This term, we have welcomed three new Year Seven students to our class.

YIRARA CLINIC

CARING FOR OUR STUDENTS...

It was a busy Term One for us in the clinic, with Congress GP appointments as a priority. We helped our students with numerous specialist appointments, such as paediatric and ENT, as well as hearing and eyesight tests.

Along with our marvellous Stars and Clontarf teams, who take some students to their weekly health checks at Congress, your children are well looked after at Yirara.

We had vaccinations this term for Gardasil and Boostrix administered. The HPV vaccine (Gardasil®) helps protect against the common types of HPV, which cause cervical cancer and some forms of cancers. Boostrix vaccine protects against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis infections. Diphtheria infection can cause breathing difficulty and damage to the heart. Tetanus infection causes painful muscle spasms that can cause trouble breathing and might lead to death. Pertussis (Whooping Cough) can be passed between people either by coughing and sneezing or during kissing or sharing eating utensils. The infection causes severe coughing, spasms, and vomiting.

We thank the team from the Deadly Heart Trek for coming to educate and screen everyone for rheumatic fever/rheumatic heart disease. Rheumatic fever is a sickness caused by a germ called Group A Streptococcus, or Strep for short. It can often cause sore throats and skin sores. If not treated with penicillin, the body's germ defence system can get confused and attack the joints, heart, brain, and skin—this is called rheumatic fever.
